



## Master's Message

**The Master, Michael Gilham,** and Immediate Past Master Richard Nevard went to unusual lengths to attract attention to the City Livery Club stand at the 2009 Guildhall Red Cross Market.

Part of the work of Master is to increase recognition of the Upholders Livery within the City and beyond. What follows is a selection of events from a typical fortnight in the Master's diary. This led the IPM to remark that within the space of a week he had found himself sitting on no less than three different **committees** with the Master.

**Lectures** are increasingly being used by Liveries to raise awareness of matters important to their trade. Thus the Master attended the Tinplate Workers Alias Wire Workers' second annual lecture

given by Will Whitehorn, President of Virgin Galactic. Will explained how they will be taking paying passengers into space within two years. The first part of the flight will lift them to 50,000 feet on the back of a jet, from which will be launched a rocket plane to carry the passengers into space for 15 minutes.

The Master then accompanied Honorary Archivist Judy Tayler-Smith to the **Livery History and Collections Forum** to discuss how to look after and use our collections of treasures and documents. That was followed by the Worshipful Company of Actuaries **Play and Supper** at Staple Inn, called 'Hanging Hooke—a genius betrayed' about the life of the founder of the Royal Society.

The Carpenters are, like us, members of the **Wood Group of Liveries** and the Master joined them for their **Court lunch**. We also have close links with the Distillers through Past Master Christopher Hayman and the Master



dined with them at Vintners' Hall that week. He attended the **City University degree ceremony**, during which the Lord Mayor was installed as Chancellor. The Master Woolman invited Michael Gilham to their **Alms Dinner**, which took place in Saddlers' Hall. He has also attended the **London Guides lecture**, which took place in the Dutch church in Crutched Friars. Finally the Master joined the Blacksmiths for lunch, through contacts made when he was last Master.

**Michael Gilham says** "On page 2 you can see that the Court has not been inactive either. The year has been spent designing the committee and review structures needed to support the Strategic Plan agreed in 2008. A focus of the Master-elect, Julian Squire, will be to implement these changes. The Court also accepted the retirement of Honorary Assistant Alan Aldous as Webmaster. It was due to his energy the Upholders were one of the first Liveries to have a website in 1998."

## Past Master James Cody

was remembered at the September Court Meeting. Past Master and Hon. Treasurer Joseph Byllam-Barnes gave an appreciation of James' life. James Cody died peacefully on Friday 7th August 2009 Cranmer Court nursing home with his family surrounding him. Amongst the many mourners 28 Upholders attended his funeral on Thursday 20th August at Beckenham Crematorium followed by a wake at The Chateau (Napoleon). James was clothed in the Livery in 1991 and became Clerk in 1998,

succeeding John Darby. In this role he was always helpful, kindly and efficient. Unusually he was appointed to the Court whilst still Clerk and became Master in 2005. He fought his illness during his year as Master with great dignity and was ably supported throughout by Jean his wife, who succeeded him as Clerk. Outside Livery James achieved much in many other spheres of his life too. He was a professional electrical engineer, forming his own company, passionately representing his trade and participating in Engineering Institutions. He also took a leading

role in his church, local politics and as a Mason. To his family he was a good father and grandfather. Many Upholders witnessed the wonderful partnership he had with Jean.

A prayer was offered for the peaceful repose of his soul. The Livery sent a donation to the Alzheimer's Society (Croydon Branch) in his memory.

**Ronald Charles Salter** passed away on 29th November 2009. Mr. Salter was clothed as an Upholder on 23rd September 1980 and is the Father in Law of Liveryman Percy Larnier.

**Alan Alston, Past Master Furniture Maker**, was remembered at the September Court meeting, as being behind the rapprochement of our two liversies, and he had a keen interest in both our trades.





As revealed at the Upholders' September Court Dinner, this photograph was returned to the Company's possession via Adam Wallis (son of William 'Ray' Wallis), who was Master in 1988 and Clerk 1978-1987. The Master standing at the head of the table (with badge) is Fredrick Smith. The Senior Warden in the photograph is Aubrey Garstin and the Junior Warden, William Hunter.

The Junior Warden, William Hunter, is of particular note as he was the grandson of one of our most distinguished members, Alderman William Hunter, Master in 1845 and Lord Mayor of London 1851-52. His father, known as William Hunter (the younger) was also Master of the Company in 1858.

The Albion Tavern was one of the largest establishments of its kind in London. The first premises (circa 1790) were on the west side of Aldersgate Street at 153 (close to the current Barbican Station). Later the Tavern moved to 172/173 Aldersgate Street, as seen in the photograph, and it is here that our Court Dinner took place. The majority of the banquets of the Corporation of London, the Sheriffs' inauguration dinners, and those of Livery Companies and committees, took place in its opulent surroundings. The building was finally demolished in the early part of the twentieth century, possibly in 1907.

A typical dinner at the Tavern would consist of Thick Spring Soup; Dorees a l'Italienne; Salmon; Whitebait; Escallopes de Ris de Veau aux Petit Pois; Poulet a l'Eclarte; Chines of Mutton; Ham and Salad; Ducklings; Goslings; Asparagus; Fruit Jellies; Pastry; Ratafia Creams; Compotes of Oranges and Ice Pudding. These were all washed down by fine wines, Champagne and Port. If you look at the photograph, you can see that each Court member has their own bottle of Champagne - how times have changed!

### Upholders Support Thames Tapestry

Our speaker at the Upholders' Church Service Dinner on 11th February will be Lizzie Owen, Chief Executive of the Millennium Tapestry Company.

Thames Heritage Trust working with the Millennium Tapestry Company is contacting a total of 240 schools from the source of the river in Gloucestershire down to the estuary with the aim of creating a unique record of Thames history, architecture, industry, nature, sport and recreation. The plan is for it to be completed by 2012 as part of the cultural component of the London



Olympics.

Each school is being asked to complete a one square metre panel depicting aspects of the Thames in their area. The pupils will be supplied with carpet canvas and all the yarns, materials and implements needed to complete their panel, and trainer sessions will be held to provide the practical know-how needed for the project. Master Michael Gilham has arranged funds from the Master's list to support an individual school's contribution to this project.

### Naval Links By Richard Nevard IPM

On 7<sup>th</sup> September the Master and IPM visited HMS Triumph in Devonport dockyard in the company of Lord and Lady Hamilton of Epsom and the Mayor of Newton Abbot. Lady Hamilton is HMS Triumph's sponsor having launched her in 1991. We met the commanding officer, Cmdr Rob Dunn, and some of the crew in their on-shore mess along with representatives of Babcock Engineering who are carrying out the refit.

Our next port of call was in the submarine training school. Here the XO gave a very clear and interesting explanation of the roles of a submarine today.

We then had need of sea sickness pills as we rode the simulator for the ship command position. Once we were 'aboard' the crew demonstrated an emergency dive and we all gripped the hand holds above us as the boat tipped steeply down and we started to fall forward. Once at periscope depth the Master took over the pilot's position and found it surprisingly difficult to keep the boat on a straight and level course at high speed. When it was all over the door swung open and we remembered that we had travelled no more than a metre or so up and down, ending exactly where we had started.

As we walked into the next cabin we were aware that the officer of the watch was working hard keeping track of two enemy ships close by. On the display we could see the other vessels as he demonstrated amazing mental agility calculating how long he could afford to wait before putting the periscope

up again. We took lunch in Drake's mess with models of the ships of all three navies that took part in the Armada hanging over our heads. After lunch we descended into HMS Triumph down a vertical ladder. We worked our way to the forward escape area where there was little room to stand. Then we made our way aft seeing much of the boat including the crew quarters, the galley and the walk in freezer for storing ice cream and other essentials which enable the boat to be fully self-sufficient when on patrol. The largest space on board is reserved for her torpedoes and missiles. Loading them is a difficult procedure with the crew having to fit rails down through the centre of the boat for them to be slid into the magazine. At the end of our tour we were permitted to walk two at a time over the reactor, through an air lock with heavy interlocking doors into the

reactor control room. In the evening after the visit we enjoyed an excellent, memorable dinner prepared and served by the ship's crew. The re-dedication ceremony for HMS Triumph will be in Devonport on Easter Saturday 3rd April.
